- We're down to 12 missing Income Certs. That's better than last month's 64
 missing certs, but we're SO close to 100%. If you're among the Tardy Twelve,
 please turn in your Certs now.
 - I could embarrass you by observing that Palomar East & Rancho Vallecitos have been at 100% for a couple months, but I won't do that.
- The latest resident complaint: "residents not controlling the actions of their adult children who are additional occupants." I'm not sure what actions folks are complaining about, but please make sure your occupants behave properly.
- SPARC, our resident services partner, is sponsoring a Scam Seminar on Sept. 10, in partnership with the San Diego County Dept. of Aging & Independent Services.
 - A resident at one of our other Parks was almost scammed out of \$15,000. She actually sent the money, but the local Police intercepted the package. Does that inspire you to attend this event?
- The Hillside work is FINALLY finished, at a total cost of nearly \$700K not
 counting the \$150K we paid the City for their portion. After all that work,
 including putting pilings into the slope, that hillside should be VERY stable.

NOTES FROM YOUR PEWRA BOARD

Just a few brief updates from your PEWRA Board,

The installation of our new board members occurred at the July meeting and with the transition from past Treasurer Simon Spears to new Treasurer Susan Friedman, an official audit of the finances and budget was successfully completed. Additionally, Millenium Housing has provided the Board with the final budget for the fiscal year 2025/2026 and we are very thankful that there was an increase in the amount allocated to support PEW activities and social functions. As a result, the PEWRA Board unanimously approved the budget for this fiscal year. A big thank you to Millenium for helping PEWRA to address the increasing costs of almost everything!

The Hillside project is making great progress, the city has finished their portion of the project, and our PEW maintenance staff are working to restore the Laundry and Car Wash.

The RV gate has been installed, with a pedestrian walkway on the side of the gate. Remote controls for the gate are available for purchase If you have a vehicle in the RV parking lot and if you have any additional questions, please contact the office.

- Please respect your neighbor's privacy and well-being. Be attentive to excessive noise and follow the PEW Rules and Regulations guidelines on hours for noise, construction, gardeners, etc. The rules state that such activities are conducted between the hours of 8AM and 7PM, Monday through Saturday, unless otherwise required by an emergency.
- A reminder to dog owners, when at the dog park or walking your pet around the community, please be sure to pick up after your dog and do not allow your pet to soil your neighbors private landscape. Also, please honor the rules at the dog park, particularly the hours of operation.

The days scheduled are September 2,3, and 4. Be sure to check which day your street will be affected and plan accordingly.



BEES AND BUTTERFLIES ARE AN ENDANGERED SPECIES By Roger Frichette

What can WE do about it????

The aim is to make Palomar Estates West a suitable habitat for bees and butterflies, particularly Monarch butterflies, through cooperative efforts.

It's pretty simple really. If we all buy plants that **bees** love, they will be attracted to those plants and thrive. Several park gardens are already filled with bees pollinating flowers and vegetables. Similarly, several park gardens already have ample Narrow Leaf Milkweed that has attracted abundant butterflies. If more of us also plant Narrow Leaf Milkweed, **Monarchs** will be attracted to the park and make it an even more beautiful place to live.

How to proceed - Butterflies

Narrowleaf Milkweed vs. Tropical Milkweed

Narrow Leaf Milkweed is GOOD! It's a California native and

is the only way to attract and feed Monarch butterflies. Monarchs only eat milkweed. And they eat a lot of it!!

Go to bloomcalifornia.org to find a nursery nearby that sells Native Milkweed

Tropical milkweed is BAD!! Eating this milkweed can make the caterpillars sick and deform the subsequent butterfly.

How to proceed – Bees

A quick search of the internet – **flowers to buy that attract bees** – has the following suggestions –

"To attract bees to your garden, focus on planting a variety of flowers that offer both pollen and nectar, particularly those with blue, purple, or yellow hues. Good choices include lavender, sunflowers, borage, bee balm (Monarda), and coneflowers (Echinacea). Additionally, consider planting catmint, goldenrod, and various salvias".

So, there you go. Why not make PEW a beacon for providing support for two of the most wonderful creatures in nature? An additional benefit – birds, hummingbirds in particular - will also continue to be attracted to the park.

Each and every one of you are encouraged to participate in this wonderful project. Just Do It!!!

Wood Destroying Beetles By Herb Field Urban Entomologist

In past articles we have discussed termites and most residents in LSM have witnessed the big tents placed over homes in our neighborhood for Drywood Termites. Some of us have experienced having our foundations drilled or baited for Subterranean Termites, but did you know that there are a host of beetles that do extensive damage to wood and furniture?

I remember consulting on a case that took me to a 10,000 square foot home off Mulholland Drive in Los Angeles. The owners had installed hard wood flooring throughout the house at an expense of over \$75,000. Three years after the installation tiny beetles started appearing on their interior window sills and tiny piles of dust on the flooring began to emerge. It turned out that they had installed flooring with the eggs of powder post beetles already inside the wood and it took three years for the beetles to go through its life cycle and emerge as an adult. It turned out that the brand-new flooring milled in Georgia had been stored in a warehouse in Orange County that had an existing population of powder post beetles and they infested the flooring prior to installation.

Have you ever bought a wicker basket or wicker furniture and every few days must wipe up some dust material that just keeps re-appearing? You probably have bamboo borers that have been in the wicker for years, most likely shipped to you with the beetles inside. A little bonus from the Chinese manufacturer.

Most wood-destroying beetles are quite small, just a few millimeters in length but in California we have a couple that are larger ranging from 7mm-20mm. The Black Polycaon beetles can leave exit holes about ¼ of an inch wide. I inspected a home in Barstow that all the cabinetry and fireplace mantels were riddled with holes five years after installation, the question was when did they infest the wood. It turned out that they were already in the wood just after the wood was milled in the south, but the time frame from eggs hatching to the adults burrowing out of the wood took years.

The California Deathwatch beetle has an interesting history; the adults of this species have a behavior of tapping its head against the wood around it. The tapping noise was considered by superstitious people around the turn of the century to be a warning of a pending death.

Control of wood-destroying beetles can be handled in a few ways. The most common is the use of a fumigant, the same methodology that is used to eliminate Drywood termites. The difference is the amount of fumigant is greatly increased to kill the beetle eggs. Another approach is to just allow the adults to emerge, seal the holes and forget about them. This may work if the infestation is localized to a small area but the emergence of these beetles may extend over months and even years. Furthermore, in some species the emerging adults may mate and re-infest the wood. If the infestation is in furniture the simplest approach is to take the furniture to a pest management professional and have it placed in a fumigation chamber for a few days causing no inconvenience to your home.
