

A warm thank you to Katie and Robin for bringing and setting up a fabulous Valentine's themed spread. There was very little left after the meeting.



Using Microclimates for better gardening

I recently read an article on microclimates and their effect on growing vegetables or any plant in the typical garden.

I've often found that certain plants will grow well in some of my boxes but when I switch them over to another box the next year they do poorly. I realized that when you research the specific plant you will find that it needs partial sun, or warmer nights than the spot that you pick for it. The slight differences in climate within your yard are called microclimates.

Examples of microclimates include: shade from another plant or tree, the heat that a wall absorbs during the day then releases it in the night, how many hours of sunlight does a certain spot in my garden get. So, to learn where your specific microclimates are in your yard you should ask these four questions.

- 1. Where is heat stored in my garden?** Heat doesn't just disappear when the sun goes down. Certain items absorb the heat from the sun and store it to be released later. They include: stone, brick, concrete and even water absorbs heat and during the night releases the thermal mass.
- 2. Which areas are exposed?** Strong winds like our Santa Anas can kill seedlings, flatten plants or snap off parts of plants, in some cases they may collapse entire support structures for mature plants. If you have physical structures such as walls that create wind tunnels the force of the wind could potentially be significantly increased.
- 3. Which areas of my garden receive the most sunlight, and how does this vary during the seasons?** Shadows cast by trees, buildings or chimneys will significantly affect the amount of sunlight. This knowledge can work for or against your garden plan. Remember just because a spot was perfect in the winter because of the amount of sunlight it got, may be the reason your plants always seemed stunted in the summer as the soil would dry out frequently.
- 4. Where does the water pool when it rains?** Low spots and areas with heavy or compacted soil will allow water to pool. This may be great for certain plants but during the cooler part of the year may help create fungus that kills the plant that you placed there.

So, understanding these concepts will help you plan each season's planting better. Moving certain plants into more shaded areas, creating windbreaks prior to a Santa Ana, eliminating areas where water collects and reading labels to understand each plant's optimal climate will produce more vegetables, more flowers and an overall healthier garden.
