MILLENNIUM MEMO

"VRBO & Airbnb coming to a Park near you!"

Have you heard about AB 861, a bill the Governor just signed? It says that if a Park rents homes, then residents can rent <u>their</u> homes as well. That sounds fair, doesn't it?

There's a difference, however. If your neighbor subleases his/her home, the Park has no control over your neighbor's renter. If the renter abuses the rules or bothers you, we can't do much about it. We have no legal arrangement with that person.

Another concern with AB 861: there are no limitations on those rentals. If a resident wants to operate a short-term vacation business, we'd likely have to allow it. Imagine the impact <u>that</u> could have!

Not in Palomar, however. Non-profit-owned parks are <u>exempt</u> from AB 861. The ban on renting can continue, your neighbors will be homeowners and the VRBO threat is gone.

Why the exemption? Because any of our homes would be available <u>only</u> to very-low or low-income folks at below-market rents. That would help Palomar meet its housing quota without having to impose limits on who can buy your home. This is good news!

We have dodged the VRBO bullet. Kudos to Assembly Member Bennett, who thoughtfully provided language in the bill that protects your Park.



INTERVIEW WITH A PEW WISE ELDER

Mr. Jim Edwards

Interviewed by Nancy Sims



Good afternoon, sir. Where and when were you born? In Aberdeen, Washington, across the river north of Portland, Oregon, on March 26. 1928.

Where did you grow up? In Walla Walla, Washington. My mother moved there to be with her family as my dad passed when I was one yr. old. Later, she remarried Jack Edwards, and they had a son, John, when I was 18. My stepfather, Jack, was a Manager at Standard Oil Co, but was laid off due to the Depression. In 1936, when I was 8, my family moved to Venice, CA. My folks were broke; my dad couldn't get a job anywhere, even though

he had a Bachelor's degree in Engineering. Mom finally got a job with Adohr Milk Farms in Los Angeles. Her job as a bookkeeper kept us going during the Depression. By the way, my mother was an accomplished musician. She was first chair for the Washington State Symphony before she married. **Very Cool!**

Where did you go to school? I graduated from Venice High School in 1945: I went to UCLA, majoring in pre-med.

Did you play any sports or extra -curricular activities? Yes, I was a very good tennis player; started when I was in High School. I played in several tournaments with the UCLA team, and I lettered for 2 years. My dad saw that I had great potential, so he took me to a pro coach in Beverly Hills, Norval Craig; I learned a whole lot from him. I worked in his pro shop stringing racquets and rallying with clients, among them Van Johnson, the actor.

In 1946, they were still drafting younger men, so I joined the Navy. I became a Hospital Corpsman in San Diego; I later worked at Long Beach Navy Hospital, since I had some pre-med experience. I was a third class Petty Officer, but I was still playing tennis in my free time.

How did that happen? The Commanding Officer at the Hospital saw that I was a good tennis player, so in exchange for teaching his kids to play tennis, he gave me the job of taking care of the pitch n' putt golf course on base.

A good deal, yes? Oh, very good! At that time, I was able to go back to UCLA and still serve in the Navy on half time duty. I played tennis, taught the C.O.'s kids to play tennis, went to school, took care of the golf course, AND did my Navy duties.



WHEW! Yes, but I enjoyed every minute!

How did you meet your wife? I was discharged from the Navy in 1948 and joined the Naval Reserves. I was still attending UCLA, where I met my wife, Patricia, through mutual friends. We

married on August 15, 1948. I was still in school; we lived in La Habra Heights, about 40 miles from campus in Westwood. I had an old Model A Ford, which I drove to school every day.

Do you have children? Yes, three, and one grandson. My oldest, Rob, lives here in the park, and also loves to play tennis. My daughter, Terry, lives with me, and helps me a lot; our youngest son, Mike, is deceased. **So sorry.** Thank you.

What about your career? The Korean War broke out in 1950 and I got called back into the Navy on active duty, assigned to the USS Bairoko in the Yellow Sea.

When I returned, I went to USC (Univ. of Southern CA) and got a degree in Geology. With a wife and three kids, I had to go to work; I worked for my wife's father, who owned the McCullough Tool Company in Los Angeles. They made tools for the oil industry. I was the General Manager; my Geology background proved to be an asset to the company.

After a few years I left the company, and moved with my family to Denver, Colorado; I attended the University of Denver and got an MBA. While in school. I started a logging company and worked there until the 1980s. My business was buying companies, building them into successful enterprises, and taking them public.

Very Impressive! What next? My wife and I bought 5 acres of land in Avon, CO, near Vail, and we built a 3 unit condo; my son Rob helped build it. Suddenly I was in the Real Estate business!

Did you ever retire? Oh yes. I retired in 1994, and we moved back to California, to this very house in PEW! The house needed a lot of work, so Patricia stayed here to supervise the work on the house, and I went back to CO for a short while to help finish digging a well.

And how do you like the Park? We have loved living here; we both were very active. We played doubles tennis at least 2 times a week. The reason we bought this place was because of the tennis courts and the lovely view.

You were also active how? We belonged to the tennis league, of course; I was a founding member of the Newcomers' Club; we helped with the events presented by the Social Committee; I was on the PEW Board for 2 years.

A very full life! Now I have some personal questions for you:

What 3 words would you use to describe yourself? I'd rather let others do that.

OK then, what would your kids say about you? I listen to their criticism all day long (ha-ha). They think I'm a pretty good guy.

What would your friends say? They'd say I was a hard worker.

Your wife? My dear Patricia passed in 2015; she was 88. She fell off a small stool and broke her hip; she never came back from the hospital. I miss her every day; we were married for 68 years. I thank her every day for being with me for so long. **So sorry for your loss.**

What is you secret to longevity? I was very active all my life. I made many good friends in my college fraternity, playing tennis, in the Navy, and in my career. I had a wonderful wife and kids. My grandson Jesse recently said to me "You've had a good life, Grandpa." I agree it's true.

In addition, I'm very religious, I am a Christian and I've been re-born. I'm not afraid of dying; I'm very ready to pass on. I have happy memories of almost all of my life.

What is your favorite memory? Our wedding day, August 15, 1948.

Any words of wisdom for our readers? God Bless Everyone.

Thank you so much for your time and interesting, inspiring conversation. You are very welcome. What a pleasant way to spend an afternoon!

Don't Fall for Door to Door Solicitors

It is against park rules for anyone to do door-to-door soliciting in the park. Many of us have had gardeners, power washers and painters knock on our doors. The only group that I know that has park permission to go door to door is the Synergy Company that does free energy saving things. If you aren't sure call the office during business hours.

The San Diego Police in a KPBS article stated the following:

"When home and someone knocks on the door without appointment, we recommend you acknowledge the knock and let them know you are home. People have been surprised when a burglar using soliciting as a front thinks no one is home and enters the home after getting no answer on a knock. Ask the purpose of the visit and observe through a peephole. If it is a solicitor, ask to see the 'Issued City License/ ID card of the person.' Do not open the door if it isn't present or even if it is and you feel uncomfortable. Inform the person of your intention to call the police if they don't have a license to solicit and then place a call to our non-emergency number of 619-531-2000. We would like you to report these persons as potential "casers" or suspects. Very rarely are good services and reputable companies using door-to-door solicitation as legitimate means of commerce. More than likely it will be someone using a ruse or scam to separate you from your money. All the stories of 'helping get to a college trip' or 'for poor children / women/ etc....' are by and large fictitious and should in no way be encouraged with your hard earned money. We regularly encounter vans full of out of state persons with criminal history staying in our motels / hotels for just this purpose."

If you need a gardener, power washer, housekeeper, or painter, ask your neighbors, or ask Next Door. There are several good ones that work in the park. Don't fall for someone looking to make a quick buck.
